- **Accountability:** Polluters must be accountable for the risks and harms toxicants impose on human and environmental health; and decision-makers must be accountable for policies that protect the safety of all communities.
- **Accessibility:** Information about toxicants should be readily available to all North Carolinians
- **Vitality:** Socially, economically and environmentally friendly products should be promoted, with emphasis on small and moderate scale local production
